Nomination procedure

The partner university has to send a nomination letter with the names, study period, study level and e-mail addresses of the students that have been nominated for an exchange at Maastricht University, Faculty of Law to the e-mail address: iro-incoming-law@maastrichtuniversity.nl

Nomination deadline for coordinators

- 15 April for the Fall semester and Full Year.
- 15 September for the Spring semester.

Application procedure

Students have to apply online. Information/instructions on how to apply online will be sent to each nominated student directly by e-mail. The student needs to upload the following application documents:

- A copy of a valid passport (passport must be valid until at least one month after the end date of the student's exchange at Maastricht University, Faculty of Law). EU citizens are allowed to upload a copy of their Identity (ID) Card (ID card must also be valid until at least one month after the end date of the student's exchange at Maastricht University, Faculty of Law).
- Portrait picture (the same size as the one displayed on the passport or ID card).
- Latest Official list of grades/academic transcript from current study, signed and stamped by home university. If you are a master student at your home university and you are applying for the law master exchange program, make sure to upload your law Bachelor's degree and your law bachelor official list of grades (in English) as well, indicating that you have obtained at least 180 ECTS in Law courses. The document needs to be signed and stamped by your home university.
- English language certificate, only for students who are nominated to participate in the law master exchange program.

Application deadline for students

- 15 May for the Fall semester and Full Year.
- 15 October for the Spring semester.

*Fall semester starts in September and ends in December or January.

*Spring semester starts in January or February and ends in June.

*Full year starts in September and ends in June.

Admission requirements

- Students nominated for the law bachelor exchange program need to have completed at least 2 semesters (1 year, 60 ECTS in law courses) of a degree in Law at their home university.
- Students nominated for the law master exchange program need to have completed at least 3 years (180 ECTS in law courses) of a degree in Law at their home university.
- Proof of English Language proficiency is also a requirement for the students participating in the law exchange master program (see language requirements for further information).
- The credits need to be obtained before the application deadline.

Language requirements

Students taking bachelor's courses

- No formal proof of English language proficiency is required from students who are nominated to participate in the bachelor exchange program, in which they are only allowed to follow law bachelor courses.

Students taking master's courses

- Students, who are nominated to participate in the law master-exchange program and who are allowed to follow bachelor and master law courses, will have to provide proof of sufficient English language proficiency.
- We will accept certificates of level B2 (not older than two years) or C1 or higher (not older than three years) of the Common European Framework of Reference issued by: an official language institute (or language centre of the home university of the student). **The level stated on the certificate needs to be based on a test regarding the reading, writing, listening and speaking English language skills of the student and not based on their English language proficiency skills during a certain course, they followed completely in English.*

Other certificates that suffice are:

- TOEFL internet-based with a score of 90 or more (not older than two years).
- IELTS with a total score of 6.5 or more (not older than two years)
- CPE (all grades, not older than two years).
- CAE (Cambridge Assessment English) of level C1 or higher (not older than three years) with the grades A, B, C or C+.
- ITACE level B2 (not older than two years).
- TOEIC (score of 720 or more for listening and reading and score of 310 or more for speaking and writing, not older than two years).

We do not accept English language certificates or statements signed by an international Relations officer! Native speakers and students following their degree program entirely in English are exempted (be it that visa requirements with regard to language level may apply and cannot be exempted). Students following their degree program entirely in English at their home university need to upload proof of this. An official transcript of grades or statement from their home university, on which is clearly stated that the student is following their degree program entirely in English, will suffice.

Courses

All courses offered to exchange students are taught in English. Exchange students are only allowed to follow law courses during their exchange at the Faculty of Law of Maastricht University, they are not allowed to follow courses at other faculties of Maastricht University.

Language courses

The Language Centre of Maastricht University offers several language courses. If exchange students are interested in a language course, we advise them to register as soon as possible, as the capacity is limited. Before they enroll in a language



course they will have to contact their home university to find out whether or not their home university acknowledge the grades/credits earned for a language course. Exchange students will receive a separate Proof of Participation and transcript of grades from the Language Centre. The grades and credits of their language courses will not appear on their transcripts of grades of their exchange. Language courses are not part of the faculty's regular course offer and require an additional fee. Students have to pay this fee themselves.

Exams and re-sits

Please note the exams and re-sit periods very carefully in the academic calendar, which can be found on [our exchange website](#). Students must be present in Maastricht to take exams and a re-sits, as planned on the examination-schedule. Unfortunately, the Examination Board of the Faculty of Law at Maastricht University does not permit students to take exams and re-sits at the student's home university. The very last re-sits of the academic year take place at the end of June/beginning of July.

THEMIS curriculum components: one-year-format

- **Selection**

Students will be selected by their home university and they will exchange on the fall term of the following academic year.

All students must demonstrate a superior level of academic performance, strong linguistic ability, as well as the desire and motivation for an international experience.

- **Study abroad term**

It offers the opportunity to acquire core knowledge and skills in an international context. While on the exchange, students will have the chance to create their own study plan by choosing their courses out of those offered by the partner school and approved by the network.

- **Joint Seminar**

The THEMIS seminar provides students with a chance to delve deeper into an area of international law relevant to their academic career. The seminar will focus on different subject each year and will be conducted in English. The program will develop by professors from the partner schools, local experts, and international faculty members. It will also provide the students with the opportunity to meet and share information with fellow network participants.

- **International Internship**

The internship is considered to be an integral part of the THEMIS educational experience. The internship gives the student a chance to put their academic knowledge into practice and begin developing their professional career. The THEMIS partners strongly recommend international internship or internships conducted abroad in an international environment (law studios, European organizations, multinationals...) and for 6 weeks. Students develop their ability to work in an international setting through their professional internships, creating a profile well-appreciated by international organizations.



THEMIS Curriculum

The THEMIS experience contains three core elements:

- › a semester abroad
- › an international internship
- › the THEMIS seminar

Semester Abroad

The semester abroad offers students the opportunity to acquire knowledge and skills in an international context. The actual duration of the student exchange is one academic semester (fall/winter semester).

Students choose courses from among a specific list of courses approved by the THEMIS network; students may choose to register for courses offered in English or in the local language of the partner institution.

During the semester abroad, **students are required to take courses for at least 30 ECTS (or equivalent for non EU partner universities) and to pass at least 24 ECTS (or equivalent for non EU partner universities) of business law classes and/or international law classes in order to validate the semester for the joint certificate.** Students are allowed to enroll in one course (up to six ECTS) offered at the partner institution which is not a THEMIS-accredited course. The 30 ECTS required for the THEMIS program may not include credits for language classes.

Internship

An internship is considered to be an integral part of the THEMIS educational path. Internships give students the chance to put their academic knowledge into practice and begin developing their professional career. Students selected for the THEMIS program are required to participate in an international law internship. In order for the internship to be considered valid for the joint certificate it, **must have an international focus, and, if full-time, it must last for a minimum of six consecutive weeks (minimum eight weeks if part-time).**

If the student is unable to participate in an internship in a foreign country, then the internship must be conducted at an international law firm, the law department of an international company, an NGO with an international focus or an international organization. Students' home and host universities are available to assist participants in the internship search; however they cannot guarantee a place to all participating students.

THEMIS Seminar

The THEMIS seminar provides students with a chance to delve deeper into an area of international law relevant to their academic career. It will focus on a different subject each year and will be conducted in English. The seminar is usually held in the spring and is taught by professors of the host and partner schools, as well as relevant local notables. The seminar is hosted by partners on a rotating basis. **Students are required to attend one THEMIS seminar during their participation in the THEMIS program.** Travel, board and lodging expenses are the responsibility of each individual student.

Selection


Each partner institution will select its own students to participate in the THEMIS program, in accordance with the guidelines jointly defined by the partners. Students must demonstrate a superior level of academic performance, strong linguistic ability as well as a desire and motivation for an international experience.

Costs

During participation in the program, students continue to pay regular tuition and fees to their home university. Partner institutions may require students to pay administrative fees for program participation. Interested students should consult the relevant office at their home institution regarding these fees.

Erasmus+ Scholarship (THEMIS partners within the Erasmus+ framework)

Students selected for the THEMIS program may apply for Erasmus+ grants through their home institution if they meet the Erasmus+ requirements. The Erasmus+ program offers students the opportunity to receive a monthly grant for one semester abroad and for undertaking a curricular internship at enterprises, research centers, and training centers.
