Course Goals	To acquire a deeper understanding of Politics and Society in recent Spanish and Latinamerican history through some of the best Spanish and Latinamerican movies produced in 20th and 21st Century.
Previous knowledge	No previous knowledge about Spanish or Latinamerican Cinema is necessary to take this course.
Prerequisits	No previous knowledge or research about Spanish or Latinamerican Cinema is necessary to take this course.
Description	

Course contribution to program	To acquire a deeper understanding of Politics and Society in recent Spanish and Latinamerican history through some of the best Spanish and Latinamerican movies produced in 20th and 21st Century.
Short description	25 hour long course (10 sessions, 2,5 hours each), taught in English. A full movie will be watched entirely in class. Students will take to mini-tests to prove they remember main facts about each movie/film director. They will also make group presentations about Spanish and Latinamerican movies not watched in class.

Activities

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In-class discussions and debates

Impromptu debates and discussions will be carried during class. Student participation is highly encouraged.

Analytical exercises

Students will contribute opinions and analysis to forums of discussion posted on moodle (each for each movie included on the syllabus)

Written and/or oral exams

Students will take two 15 minute long mini-tests (mid-term and final) about the movies watched in class.

Readings

Before each movie is watched, the professor will provide a brief introduction to the movie, key biographical facts about the Director, etc. Exceptionally, longer lectures will be carried by the professor (Spanish Movies before and during Franco's years)

Presentations

Each student will contribute to a 15 minute-long oral group presentation about a Spanish movie not included in the syllabus

Essays

Students will have to write one single final essay: 4 pages long at least, double spaced, with two sections: a) main take-aways from the course and b) a very personal analysis of any Spanish movie.

1	"La Lengua de las Mariposas" by José Luís Cuerda: Spain on the brink of the 1936-1939 Civil War			
2	"Vicky, Cristina, Barcelona" by Woody Allen: Barcelona through the eyes of a foreign film-maker + Cinema and Morals			
3	"Volver" by Pedro Almodóvar: Spain after Franco's Dictatorship. Values, attitudes and customs in Modern Spain.			
4	"Te Doy Mis Ojos" by Icíar Bollaín: Gender Violence in Spain			
5	"Cebra", a short film directed by Félix Fernández de Castro and written by Alex Fernández de Castro. Students will learn how a script is written, and how it becomes a film.			
6	"Los Olvidados" by Luís Buñuel: less compliant film directors during Francisco Franco's dictatorship (1936-1939)			
7	"Diarios de Motocicleta", by Walter Salles. One of the best Latinamerican film produced in recent times, about Che Guevara before he became a communist leader.			
8	"Mar Adentro", by Alejandro Amenábar. Assisted Suicide in Spain.			
9	"Priorat", a documentary directed by David Fernández de Castro. The success story of a few enterpreneurs, who turned Priorat, in Southern Catalunya, into one of the most prestigious wine-growing regions in the world.			
10	"Ocho Apellidos Vascos", by Emilio Martínez Lázaro: the biggest commercial success in the history of Spanish Cinema. A romantic comedy about regional differences within Spain.
