Course Goals

The course examines Spain's and Catalunya's recent past, with the objective of making students understand the beliefs, practices and relationships that have shaped Barcelonians, Catalans and Spaniards over time.

Students, who are asked to visit historically significant sites or to discuss recent news related to Spain or Catalunya, work with primary sources themselves, learning how to do the interpretive work that makes meaning out of historical material. As such, students evaluate the uses and the limitations of certain primary sources.

Finally, the course considers how the questions we ask and the sources available to us shape our knowledge of the past and our understanding of its significance.

No previous knowledge is needed, although it will help to read any of the recommended books (bibliography section), and to start reading online news about Spanish Politics and Current Issues

Activities

In-class discussions and debates

Impromptu debates will be initiated by the professor, to ensure maximum dialogue and interaction

Analytical exercises

Students will have to share their opinion about multiple topics through forums of discussion.

Written and/or oral exams

There will be one mid-term and one final mini-test, each of them multiple choice style, 15 minute long, consisting of 50 questions. Three possible answers to each question, only one possible correct answer.

Presentations

Lectures and discussing current news by the professor take about 50% of the time

Students will present once during the course, either individually or as a group, about Spanish Recent History, Politics or Current Issues, as long as each presentation includes valuable insights into Barcelona, Catalunya or Spain

Essays

Participants will have to submit one final essay: 4 pages long, with two sections: a) main take-aways from the course, b) a personal comment/analysis about some current issues/recent news related to Spanish Recent History/Politics
