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Previous knowledge	The student's background in the course "Geopolitics" will be a great addition to address "Advanced Geopolitics", as many of the latter concepts are based on the former's.
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Prerequisites	No previous course is a must to enroll in "Advanced Geopolitics".
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Teaching methodology	<p>The teaching and learning dynamics gravitate around presential sessions, complemented with autonomous work.</p> <p>During the class sessions, student participation is encouraged. Every session is designed to foster participation through firechats, debates, opinions and other contributions.</p> <p>Each session will require a complementary autonomous work in order to prepare specific topics that are part of the exam content. This will imply reviewing the session materials (slides) as well as selected articles and other resources (available via Moodle or recommended in class).</p> <p>Further code of conduct guidelines, resources and recommendations will be provided in the course's syllabus and in class.</p>
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Description

Course contribution to	This course furthers the learning of "Geopolitics" of the first year syllabus. It dives and explores the key geopolitical theories, doctrines and associated foreign policies that have shaped the contemporary world.

Short description

This course analyses the main geopolitical dynamics since the late XIX century until nowadays. It pays particular attention, among others to WWI (1914-18), the Interwar Period (1919-1939), WWII (1939-1945), The Cold War (1947-1991), the consequences of the 9-11 attacks in 2001, the Iraq invasion in 2003, the 2022 invasion of Ukraine and the latest geopolitical events in the Middle East and the South China Sea/Taiwan.
