Course Goals

Labor market inequality, especially the widening gap in earnings between the highest- and lowest-paid workers, has become a widespread and persistent trend in many countries over the past several decades. Understanding its causes is crucial not only for designing effective policy responses, but ultimately for preserving market-based, democratic institutions. We explore the key drivers of earnings inequality and why these patterns vary significantly across nations. It begins by examining the role of human capital—such as education, skills, and capabilities—in shaping workers' outcomes, both historically and in the future. Next, we examine how employers and labor market institutions shape inequality, and how government policies can reduce disparities.
